The 26th International Conference on Neutrino Physics and Astrophysics, Neutrino 2014, will be held in Boston, U.S.A. from June 2 through 7, 2014. The Conference is co-hosted by Boston University, Harvard University, M.I.T., and Tufts University. The Conference serves as a biannual review of the field of neutrino physics with new experimental results and theoretical developments presented in an invited plenary lecture format accompanied by two poster sessions. 
1. Registration

The registration desk is located on the second floor of the George Sherman Union at Boston University, near the lecture venue. The desk will be open from 17:00 to 19:00 on Sunday June 1, with light snacks and refreshments provided. The desk will reopen Monday June 2 at 8 AM and remain open throughout the day. Participants who arrive on subsequent days may register at the Conference secretariat desk.

2. Conference Venue

The Conference will be held at the **George Sherman Union** on Boston University's Charles River Campus (marked 11 on the adjacent map, enter as shown by the black arrow). The George Sherman Union is located at 775 Commonwealth Avenue, Boston MA 02215, and is easily accessible by public transportation. The nearest stop is Boston University Central on the B line of the Green Line, marked by the MBTA symbol.

Smaller meeting rooms are available for satellite meetings. Please contact the Conference organizers to reserve a room and refer to the Conference website for room assignments and schedule.



Luggage storage for inbound and outbound travelers will be available at the venue.

Internet connection: Conference attendees staying in the Boston University Student Village will receive instructions for connecting to the B.U. network. Attendees staying at hotels will be provided with connection instructions in their registration packets.

4. Poster Session

Two separate poster sessions will be held on Tuesday evening and Friday evening. Posters should be mounted by 5 PM the afternoon of each session and may remain up until Wednesday at 17:00 and Saturday at 14:00, respectively.

5. Proceedings

Proceedings for the Neutrino 2014 Conference will be published by the American Institute of Physics Conference Proceedings (AIPCP). The proceedings will be comprised of written contributions for each of the oral presentations. Poster presentation titles and presenters will be listed. Written contributions should be submitted by October 7, 2014 (4 months after the end of the conference). Edited versions will then be transmitted to the publishers. The Proceedings will appear about six months after the end of the conference in an AIPCP open access web site. This site will be accessible to anyone in perpetuity.

For those who desire a printed version of the Proceedings, bound copies may be ordered from the Neutrino 2014 Conference website: <u>http://neutrino2014.bu.edu/proceedings/</u>. The cost of the printed version of the Proceedings will be \$75 including shipping. This cost was not included in the conference registration fee— printed and bound proceedings are an option. Orders must be placed before November 1, 2014.

10. Travel

Arriving by plane: The closest airport is Logan Airport in Boston, which is about eight miles from campus. From the terminal, follow the signs to Ground Transportation, where you can take a taxi to campus or take a shuttle to the MBTA (see below).

Taxi: The fare to Boston University's Charles River Campus from Logan Airport should be approximately \$45. You can get an authorized taxi from a taxi stand outside each terminal. There is usually a short line and a dispatcher will place you in the next available taxi. When traffic is light, the taxi ride will take about 20 minutes. During peak hours, the ride could take 45 minutes or more. It is customary for the passenger to add a gratuity of 10-15% to the fare. Around town you can hail taxi cabs on the street or find taxi stands in front of many hotels.

MBTA Shuttle & Subway

Boston has a comprehensive public transportation system known as the MBTA or the "T," with bus lines, trolleys, and subway trains running throughout the city. We encourage you to purchase a <u>Charlie Card</u>. Charlie Cards are free and may be obtained at ticket windows, for example at South Station and Kenmore Station, until 7 pm, seven days a week. There are also Charlie Tickets, available by machine, but passengers pay a small surcharge. Charlie Cards and Charlie Tickets may have money added to their balance as needed. You can use the <u>MBTA's Trip Planner</u> or Google Maps <u>transit directions</u> to find your way.

The MBTA has <u>up-to-date advice posted</u> for travelers arriving at Logan Airport. Although travel via Blue Line to Government Center looks like a good route on some maps, Government Center Station is currently closed. Your best option via the T is to take the Silver Line (really a bus). Inbound (only) from Logan Airport is free and this includes a free transfer to the MBTA subway system. Take a Silver Line bus from the curbside outside your terminal to South Station. At South Station, exit onto a platform and follow the platform until you find signs to the Red Line, inbound to Alewife. Change to the Green Line at Park Street Station. On the Green Line take an outbound Boston College (B) train to BU Central for the George Sherman Union or St. Paul St. for the Student Village. Alternatively, you may take any B, C, or D train to exit at Kenmore Station.

Another option for travel from the airport is to take Back Bay Logan Express (\$5, run by Massport) to either Copley or Hynes Auditorium stations, from which you may continue on the MBTA Green Line.

To travel from Boston back to Logan Airport for your departure, take the MBTA (not free in the outbound direction) to South Station and transfer to the Silver Line to Logan Airport.

By car: If you are arriving by car, we assume you can find directions using online mapping programs or your smartphone's GPS. The address of the Student Village Housing is 10 Buick Street, Boston, Massachusetts 02215.

Parking: There is no provision for overnight parking at the Student Village. Boston University has a single overnight lot for visitors, at 808 Commonwealth Avenue Lot ($\underline{\text{Lot F}}$). This open air lot is located directly next to the Fuller Building, near the BU Bridge. The rate of this lot is \$24/day and the parking must be purchased from the lot attendant. The lot is attended weekdays from 7AM to 9PM and the only method of payment accepted at this lot is cash. While the vehicle is parked in



the lot, the ticket issued by the lot attendant should be displayed on the dashboard. On weekends, you may park at metered spaces on Commonwealth Ave. or other city streets (meters are free on Sunday).

An alternative for long-term overnight parking is to use <u>MBTA parking</u>. The most convenient lot is probably <u>Riverside</u>, which is at the end of MBTA the Green Line, a ride of about 30 minutes. The cost is \$13 for the first day plus \$7 per day thereafter.
